The New IHM

The 2025-2026 academic year at Immaculate Heart of Mary School (IHM) began on September 3, 2025. Preparation for this year, however, took place throughout the summer with a considerable amount of hard work to prepare the new facilities.

Renovations to merge the old and new sides of the building started immediately after graduation, beginning with the pav-

ing of the newly rerouted driveway. Brothers and volunteers removed the old brick walkway and replaced it with a new path leading to the building's entrance.

Old classrooms were enlarged by removing the walls between them and adding closets to



each room. The floors of the former refectories were refinished, and the room was transformed into a bright first-

grade classroom, with a school nurses' station next door.

Additionally, the old kitchen was rede-

signed to function as a lunch service kitchen, and office. The Brothers are also converting

the old library into the principal's office and a conference room.

Thanks to the new elevator, books were relocated to a spacious new library on the third floor, where custom-made shelves provide better organization. On same level is the art room, from which can be seen a panoramic view of the valley below and Mount Wachusett, inspiring creativity among our young artists. The basement of the new addition, referred to as the function hall, is currently used as a lunchroom for grades 5 through 8.

Outside, the exterior stone facing of the cupola is finished. Soon the cupola will house a marble statue of Our Lady Help of Christians,

overlooking the school campus and chapel. Landscaping has begun, and a new shrine was recently constructed to enhance the front lawn, that will feature a marble statue of Saint Louis Marie de Montfort.

Just a few details remain; and the completion of the Expansion Project is finalized. We are already seeing its positive impact.

It was a joy to participate, especially with our Sister Mary Clair, MICM, speaking at the conference. May God bless everyone who contributed to making the conference such a great success!




Food for Thought


Camp Season Highlights
